The 2018-2019 academic year was filled with excitement and change. We officially changed our name to Missio Seminary, secured a new location in Philadelphia, and received over \$1.77 million in donations! To say that we were busy would be an understatement!

Our Strategic Plan (2015-2020) called for us to move to Philadelphia by 2020 and we have achieved that goal! The new location, 421 N. 7th Street, is centrally located in the heart of Philadelphia, just west of the Ben Franklin Bridge, north of Old City, and east of Chinatown. The new campus also has nearby access to both bus and train transportation and a plethora of parking options (both free and paid).

The Lord has been with us every step of the way and he continues to bring inspiring men and women to the seminary who are fully committed to following Jesus into the world!

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Missio Seminary is a Christian seminary committed to the gospel of Jesus Christ and a generously orthodox Christian faith for the purpose of preparing missional leaders to serve the church. We are intent on maintaining the following convictions in the life and work of our community.

In 1971 Dr. Allan A. MacRae and Dr. John (Jack) W. Murray stood in the parking lot of a vacant elementary school and prayed for God's help in establishing a new theological school that would forward the vision God had laid on the hearts of both men. Dr. MacRae was a gifted Bible scholar and communicator, and Jack Murray a well-known evangelist with a knack for presenting the message of salvation. Together they represented two passions that would become hallmarks of Biblical Theological Seminary (renamed Missio Seminary in 2018) — a deep desire to search and understand the Scriptures and a keen interest in effectively reaching people with the hope of the gospel. We believe God heard their prayer. We aspire to continue manifesting God's answer to that prayer in our current endeavors, including through the unanimous adoption of this missional convictions statement.

- The missional character of the Christian church: We believe the life and witness of the church should be thoroughly shaped by its participation in the mission of God to reconcile the world to Himself in Jesus Christ, and by the call of Jesus to be the people of God sent into the world to proclaim and live out the gospel.
- The primacy of scripture for Christian faith and life: We believe Scripture is inspired by God and as such is infallible and authoritative for the life and witness of the church throughout history and across cultures.
- The indispensable significance of Christian tradition: We affirm the summary of Christian faith taught in the Apostles' Creed and the Nicene Creed and are committed to seeking wisdom from the history and traditions of the church.
- The necessity of cultural engagement: We are committed to ongoing engagement with culture and the world for the sake of our witness to the gospel, and to continual learning from Christians in other cultural settings.

On the afternoon of May 2, 1971, Dr. Allan A. MacRae accepted Dr. John Weir Murray's offer of the presidency of a new seminary that was yet to be named. However, Dr. MacRae requested that no announcement be made until potential students and potential private contributors were contacted.

The location for the new school had not been determined and the issue of conferring degrees was not yet tackled. Another meeting was held on June 2 reviewing questions concerning staff, library, accreditation, name, publicity, faculty, curriculum, overall emphasis, doctrinal basics, and catalog. Starting the seminary was no small task but Dr. MacRae and Dr. Murray worked diligently.

Opening day for the new seminary was planned for September. Accommodations for faculty and students would have to be found within weeks. Finally, a suitable property was found in Hatfield, Pa. The former Hatfield Joint Consolidated School building was constructed in 1921 and was vacated by the township in 1970. Dr. Murray persisted in negotiations and was able to secure the building in July 1971, only two months before classes were slated to begin.

The school determined from the beginning to become a meaningful part of the community. Outreach programs were developed and on February 28, 1972 the school announced several learning programs designed for the general public.

The reputation of the founders, the quality of the faculty, and the school's desire to become involved with the community was recognized early, encouraging partnership and support from many sources.

Throughout its history Missio Seminary has been under the care of Divine Providence, as our needs have been met at every turn. As we establish the seminary in the city of Philadelphia we do so mindful of the passion, courage, and faith of our founders.



Remembering Dr. J. Robert Vannoy

On February 3, 2019 founding faculty member Dr. J. Robert Vannoy completed his earthly journey. He was 81 years old. Dr. Vannoy was a protégé of Dr. Allan A. MacRae (Old Testament scholar and the Seminary's first president). This tandem started the seminary with a powerhouse of Old Testament scholarship.

During his tenure Dr. Vannoy played a crucial role in creating an institution known for its adherence to Scripture and its concern for the well-being of its students. He taught for 34 years and contributed considerably to academic and curriculum development. In 2002 Dr. Vannoy was appointed the Allan A. MacRae Professor of Biblical Studies. Following his appointment he noted, "Wherever the Bible touches on a subject, its message should be accepted as final," but "if the Bible leaves certain question open, then Christians should do likewise."

Dr. Vannoy earned his ThD at The Free University of Amsterdam with his focus on the Old Testament. He was considered one of the leading scholars on the books of Samuel and Kings and wrote study notes on those books for the *NIV Study Bible*, published in 1985. Those notes were adapted and used in the *NASB Study Bible*, published in 1999. He also provided study notes for the *New Geneva Study Bible* (1995) and was a contributor for the revision of *The New Living Translation*, published in 2004. In 2009 he authored *1-2 Samuel, Cornerstone Biblical Commentary*.

Not just a biblical scholar, Dr. Vannoy was a devoted husband and father. He and his wife Kathe were married for 53 years and raised four children – Anna, Robert, Mark, and Jonathan – and were blessed with 16 grandchildren. Dr. Vannoy was also a faithful churchman. In the early 1980s he helped plant Covenant Presbyterian Church in Harleysville, PA where he served as a teaching elder, leader, and faithful parishioner to the end of his life.

Dr. Vannoy will be greatly missed.



What is PULPIT?

PULPIT (Program for Urban Leaders and Pastors in Transition) is a monumental program for Missio Seminary and will equip pastors in the Philadelphia metro region with effective strategies to thrive personally and professionally. The program is led by Reverend Valerie Andrews and involves expert teaching and training developed by Dr. Kyuboem Lee and Dr. Taunya Tinsley.

PULPIT is funded through the Lilly Endowment's Thriving in Ministry initiative that supports a variety of religious organizations across the nation as they create or strengthen pastoral leadership in Christian congregations. This has been a grantmaking priority at Lilly Endowment for nearly 25 years. "Leading a congregation today is multi-faceted and exceptionally demanding," said Christopher L. Coble, Lilly Endowment's vice president for religion. "When pastors have opportunities to build meaningful relationships with experienced colleagues, they are able to negotiate the challenges of ministry and their leadership thrives. These promising programs, including PULPIT, will help pastors develop these kinds of relationships, especially when they are in the midst of significant professional transitions."

Why PULPIT?

- More than 1/3 of pastors are a high or medium risk of burnout (Barna Group, 2017)
- 43% of pastors are at high or medium relational risk in family, friendships, or other close relationships (Barna Group, 2017).

Andrews serves as the Lead Pastor of Eternal Life Missionary Baptist Church in Philadelphia. Previously she has served at The Church of the Redeemer Baptist with Rev. Dr. Wayne E. Croft, Sr., and at Bible Way Baptist Church with Dr. Damone B. Jones, Sr. Rev. Andrews is the proud mother of three children, Joy, Jasmine and Ronald Jr. Her life Scripture is Isaiah 40:31. Her passion in ministry is to enhance leadership for the Kingdom of God by providing training and tools for church effectiveness!

A student story: Greg Jackson



Enduring trials of many kinds built faith and birthed a calling in Greg Jackson (MDiv '21). He suffered with sickle cell disease until he was cured through a bone marrow transplant from his brother. In his college years, he experienced cardiac arrest and surgery to repair a collapsed lung before undergoing a lung transplant at the age of 29. For six weeks Greg waited for a new set of lungs

in the hospital ICU while on life support. The very night doctors feared would be his last, God made a way and provided lungs through a donor. Greg felt a deeper meaning as a Christian and said, "The life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ had a deeper meaning to me. For me to live, somebody had to die." During his recovery Greg held onto Jesus' exchange with Peter in Luke 22, "Simon, Simon behold Satan has asked to sift you like wheat, but I have prayed for you that your faith may not fail, and when you have turned again, strengthen your brothers." Greg felt as if Jesus was speaking directly to him through this verse and he prayed fervently that his "faith may not fail" and knew that if he survived he was called to "strengthen his brothers" through ministry.



Founders Day October 6, 2018

Current and former faculty, alumni, students, and friends of the seminary celebrated Missio's 47th anniversary. Displays throughout the campus highlighted important events in the seminary's history. A Year of Blessing fiscal year 2019

The year which ended on June 30, 2019 was a year of historic changes and tremendous blessing at Missio Seminary. We changed our name, sold our dorm facility, and successfully secured our new location (421 N. 7th Street) in Philadelphia! While it was extremely busy, the Lord graciously provided through it all. By God's grace, and the abundant generosity of our partners, our total gift income was more than \$1.77 million. This was our highest total gift income in more than 15 years and an increase of 120% over last year. As a result of the sale of our dorm and the generosity of our partners we were able to finish the year with a net surplus of over \$800,000! Here are how the last two years compared:
